Welcome from the Programme Committee

The Eighth Tartu Conference comes at the time of a critical shake-up of East European and Eurasian area studies. Discussions about decentring and decolonising have challenged previously dominant paradigms for thinking about the regions in this part of the world. The overreliance on the 'post-Soviet' lens, which homogenised peoples and territories spanning the Baltic Sea to the Pamir Mountains, has come under increasing scrutiny. Russia's ongoing full-scale war against Ukraine and its global repercussions are also forcing academics to confront important ethical, methodological, and logistical questions about how to conduct research on Eastern Europe and Eurasia in the face of limits on mobility, restricted fieldwork opportunities and inaccessible archives, and political constraints on intellectual freedom. The theme of this year's conference – Area Studies in Crisis? – reflects these shifting sands and we invite you all to be part of the conversations shaping what the future of Eastern European and Eurasian Studies could look like.

The 2024 Tartu Conference programme gives us much source for optimism. We are delighted to bring together over 240 scholars from 32 countries and representing all career stages. We also extend a special welcome and express our solidarity with the Ukrainian participants ioining us in person and online. Over the course of two days. we will have panels showcasing cutting-edge research on topics such as the impact on and response of Ukrainian society to Russia's war, authoritarianism, the far right, civil society, and migration, as well as the imperial and colonial legacies shaping identity, history, memory, culture, and environment. Our plenary speakers, Asel Doolotkeldieva and Natalie Koch, invite us to consider ways of unbounding Central Asia, a theme carried throughout the conference in the roundtables on transnational and global history and papers about shifting regionalisms and international alignments. We also have sessions devoted to discussing current issues in our profession, including ways of incorporating more diverse and inclusive voices, narratives, languages, and methods into our research and teaching, and how to support early career scholars in navigating the challenges of the neoliberal higher education landscape. We hope that the programme will not only enrich your knowledge but also inspire new ideas and collaborations to be carried forward.

This conference has been made possible thanks to the generous support of the United States Embassy in Tallinn and the Faculty of Social Sciences at the University of Tartu. We extend our heartfelt gratitude to the conference organising team – Maili Vilson, Aigerim Nurseitova, Jan Terentjev, and Varje Kuut – whose tireless efforts are essential for the success of the conference. Asel Doolotkeldieva is a Nonresidential Fellow at George Washington University, based in Kazakhstan. She has obtained her PhD in Politics from the University of Exeter, UK, and previously worked at the OSCE Academy in Bishkek. She was also a visiting fellow at ZOIS and ZMO, Berlin, and College Mondial at FMSH, Paris. Her recent work looks at various epistemic and ontological implications of knowledge produced within post-colonial Central Asian Area Studies. Natalie Koch is Professor in the Department of Geography and the Environment at Syracuse University's Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs. She is a political geographer working on geopolitics, nationalism, and state power in the resource-rich states of post-Soviet Central Asia and the Arabian Peninsula. She is the author of *Arid empire: The entangled fates of Arizona and Arabia* (Verso, 2022), *The geopolitics of spectacle: Space, synecdoche, and the new capitals of Asia* (Cornell University Press, 2018), as well as editor of several books, including most recently, *Spatializing authoritarianism* (Syracuse University Press, 2022).


